PRIME Grants!

Students of the Rock Island-Milan School District will benefit from over a quarter of a million dollars in PRIME Grants for the 2024-2025 school year! 122 PRIME Grants were awarded by the Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation at the District's All-Staff meeting held on August 1 in the RIHS Auditorium. The \$256,240 in PRIME Grants will fund innovative projects and materials throughout every school of the RIMSD. 138 Educators were awarded grants for projects in literacy, STEM/STEAM, music, art, physical education, social-emotional learning, EL, cultural awareness, and many more!

Teachers/Educators submit their PRIME Grant applications with project proposals for the upcoming year by the deadline in May. Individual teachers may apply for up to \$1,500, departments or schools up to \$3,000, and those applying for programs affecting multiple schools may request up to \$5,000. The PRIME Grant Committee comprised of RIMEF board members, retired RIMSD educators, and a representative from the Dept. of Teaching and Learning evaluate each application and make the final determination for the awards. All projects must be completed within the school year and a follow-up report with photos sent to the RIMEF.

PRIME stands for "Promoting Rock Island Milan Education." The RIMEF believes that every student is entitled to a quality education and this critical program perfectly aligns with our mission to "enhance academic opportunities for student success." The PRIME Grant Program is made possible through funding from our donors, our Major Saver campaign, and the generosity of: Rauch Family I Foundation, Rock Island Art Guild, Alfaretta Young Foundation, Doris and Victor Day Foundation, the Barbara Fackel Fund. Donors Making a Difference: Jerry and Sue Farrow Horton



Jerry and Sue Horton give to make a difference. They like to support smaller non-profits and organizations; those that allow them to see what's being accomplished and their impact. The Hortons generously support the Rock Island-Milan Education Foundation, and they can see how their dollars are "making a difference" for the students and schools of the Rock Island-Milan School District.

Jerry and Sue grew up in Rock Island within just a few blocks of each other. Each started out at Rock Island's Grant School: Jerry then transferred to St. Joseph School and graduated from Alleman – Sue stayed at Grant, continued to Franklin Junior High and was a graduate of Rocky's Class of 1963. After graduating, Jerry initially worked at Farmall and in 1965, they were both hired by Bituminous Casualty in Rock Island. Despite growing up so close to each other and working for the same company, they didn't meet until years later after life and circumstances brought them to the Michigan branch of Bituminous. That fateful move finally brought them together – they married, moved to Florida, and Jerry founded a new company, USG Insurance Services.

USG Insurance Services, a wholesale/broker company, writes in all states, has 20+ branch offices, 200+ employees, and works with 400+ different companies world-wide. Jerry is CEO/Chair and Sue is Vice-President of Human Resources. When they are not working, they love to travel, golf, and the company of friends. The Hortons are active philanthropists who give back to their roots through the RIMEF, Alleman, and Friendship Manor. They are also support two projects in the Florida area: research at Moffit Hospital in Tampa for a vaccine to prevent childhood leukemia and the *Foundation Fighting Blindness* which drives research to provide preventions and treatments for retinitis pigmentosa and the spectrum of retinal degenerative diseases.

Neither Sue nor Jerry graduated from college. As a very successful business couple, they wanted to support students going into the trades. With the Horton's gracious donations, the RIMEF established the Jerry and Sue (Farrow) Horton Scholarship. The Hortons strongly believe in the potential of any student and this scholarship supports those who will further their education/career pursuits via a trade school, technical school, community college, or as a CNA or Nurse. The Hortons have also provided funding to support students taking dual-credit courses and the RIMSD EL Dept's Seal of Biliteracy.

Nine Rock Island High School students earned either the Seal of Biliteracy or the commendations towards Seal of Biliteracy!

In 2022-2023, RIMSD #41 implemented the Illinois State Seal of Biliteracy and the Commendation toward Biliteracy for students who attain proficiency in English and another language.





The Illinois Seal of Biliteracy (SoBL) recognizes high school graduates who have attained a high level of proficiency in English and in one or more other world languages. This recognition is designated on a student's transcript and high school diploma. It also is a definite statement of accomplishment to future employers, colleges, and universities. Per Illinois State statute, colleges and public universities are required to award course credit to a student who has received a State Seal of Biliteracy.

The Seal of Biliteracy program is funded for the district through the RIMEF by a generous donation from Jerry & Sue Horton.

Ms. Mohr RI Academy, 2nd Grade "Creating an Inclusive Classroom" "We were able to purchase materials to encourage concept development, such as early literacy and writing skills, counting, patterns, colors, and number recognition skills. We were able to add some interesting items to our science area to encourage children to explore their world."

"Students participated in Lights on Program and had a Mindfulness & Craft Event." Students learned about how stress impacts the brain & learned self-regulation. Affirmation necklaces/bracelets were created to boost students' confidence. Students enjoyed playing CBT (cognitive & behavioral therapy) games that allowed them to share their emotions & experiences."

Students' enthusiasm for learning has increased through the experience. Families were also more involved in the classroom."

"The goals of the project were to increase AP test scores & increase understanding... Students learned about renewable energy through engagement rather than just reading about it. Students visited different stations around the lab to determine energy output (solar, wind, & fuel cells.) It was hands on learning and a great review... Compared to last year, the multiple choice scores improved by 10%... I think the models at the stations really helped the students understand the concepts.

During this lab, students dissected squid and were able to make comparisons to other mollusks and animals with similar anatomy. Students were engaged for two full days of work. They were excited and interested in what they were studying...it provided students with unique opportunities to engage in the science curriculum. The goals were to supply students with supplemental materials...(and)...provide unique STEM materials for students to engage with."

"Students experienced art & creating with high quality materials and were able to enhance their knowledge and skills in Art. ... exposure to art techniques and supplies students otherwise would not have had with basic supplies. Through hands on experiences, creation technique and innovation, students met art goals this year.
